THE RANDALL B. SMITH Collection of Spanish Civil War material is now available to researchers. Smith (1916-1989) was a veteran of the Spanish Civil War who collected a variety of materials relating to the history of that conflict. His papers, which include tape recorded interviews with a number of veterans, document the experiences of Americans and Canadians who fought in the Spanish Civil War. These materials date from 1936 to 1985. They also provide information on organizations and movements in which these individuals were participants, such as the Communist Party, the labour movement, the Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, and the opposition to US foreign policy in central America. THE NEXT NATIONAL Conference of the Australian Society for the Study of Labour History is to be held in Newcastle, NSW, industrial city and sea port on 25, 26 June 1993. Less than one hundred miles due north of Sydney, it was the first European industrial site in Australia. From there, limestone for the first large public buildings was gained from sea shells, the first coal gathered, and the first organized large-scale smelting carried on.

The region's labour and industrial history, and its importance to Australian history, is virtually unknown outside the ranks of a few specialists. The 1993 Conference aims to change all that. Besides the broader context one would expect in such a gathering it aims to be a 'Celebration of History' for the region, and will attempt to translate the obvious pride local people have in their heritage into means for their advancement — that is, into jobs, ideas and inspirations.

It hopes to be innovative in content and structure; to involve events other than papergiving; to involve more 'ordinary' people in its development and presentation; to continue the extension of Labour History beyond political parties and trade unions; and to cross-fertilize categories and sessions.
